

I thought you should know – December 13, 2020

Last week I told you about a goal your parish staff set: "dramatically better Sunday by August 15, 2020", and I told you why we think this goal matters: our Lord wants us to be **a growing parish of growing disciples**. But why do we think that the most important step we can take to become a growing parish of growing disciples is to make Sunday dramatically better?

Sunday is where most people meet our parish. If Sunday worship is consistently fantastic, parishioners will have confidence inviting friends and family to come pray with us. If Sunday worship is consistently fantastic, people will grow here, change here, and love here, and they will want to share the treasure which they have found here with others.

If you are reading this, you probably know what a treasure we have at every Mass: Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist, uniting us to his prayer to the Father and speaking to us in his words. People who are taking their first steps towards God don't know what you know. Many of them won't discover the treasure present in our Sunday worship unless our faith family, our music, our message, and our welcome on Sunday make them want to go deeper in faith and help them to seek God.

Ok, here is week 2 of our "Peace on Earth" message series for Advent.

How was your week? How was your prayer?

Since you might be new here, let me fill you in on what's going on. Last week, we invited everyone to commit to daily personal prayer as part of our "Peace on Earth" message series to prepare for Christmas. Our idea is that Christmas is likely to be weird this year, but if we learn to pray well, we can taste God's peace, and we can carry away from this weird Christmas a permanent gift for all the normal Christmases to come. Let's prepare for Christmas by learning to pray well.

Toward that goal, I'm going to give you some coaching on prayer, and part of coaching is practice. So I'd like to invite you closing your eyes. If you are open to it, would you please close your eyes, relax, and follow along with this next part in your heart.

Let us remember that we are in the holy presence of God.—Let's look back on the last day, the last twenty-four hours, and whatever was good, let's give God thanks for that now in our hearts.—Let's look back on the last day, the last twenty-four hours, and whatever was bad, wherever we sinned or missed the mark, let's ask God to forgive now in hour heart.—Let's look to the days ahead, to the weeks ahead, and whatever we'd like God to bless, whoever we'd like him to help, let's ask him now in our own hearts to please help.—Finally, if you can, in the quiet of your own hearts, I invite you to say to God, "I love you."

Alright, you can open your eyes, if you want. Thank you for taking time for prayer.

I hope you had a moment of peace in that prayer; sometimes, however, prayer can be a desert. Maybe you've experienced desert prayer even in this last week. When I say "desert prayer", and I'm talking about times when you go pray and the minutes crawl by, or you inside you feel empty or tired, or your mind is filled with distractions or doubts. Desert prayer is not fun; but God permits desert prayer for good reasons.

One time in my that happened was during my first year of seminary. I was trying to pray for a whole hour, which for me, was a big deal. As the hour started, I was distracted and restless, and as the minutes went by, I started feeling pressure inside, like I wanted leave and get out, stronger and stronger, till I started almost to feel a panic, and I began to worry that if I stayed there praying, I sustain permament mental damage from praying so hard. I might crack up! (I can be a little melodramatic. 2) Finally the clock said an hour had passed, and I genuflected and turned to get out, not feeling great, frustrated that prayer and been so hard and wondering what the point had been. And as I turned and walked out that chapel, God flooded into my heart this really strong sense of his presence, that he knew and he loved me. That moment was like what the Book of Sirach says in the bible: "For it is easy in the eyes of the LORD suddenly, in an instant, to make the poor rich". That one moment made the whole hour of struggle totally worth it.

Prayer can be a desert, but in that desert, we prepare the way of the Lord, a highway for our God. And the Lord takes

down the mountains and fills up the chasms that separate us from him. One reason God permits desert prayer to occur is that desert prayer teaches us to love God for who he is, as a person, rather than just to love the good feelings or the gifts God gives. It is like when a new baby comes home: everyone loves the baby, till it's time to change the diaper. The dirty diapers challenges the family to love more the feeling of excitement that the baby brings, or how cute the baby looks, or the good hopes the baby stirs up. The dirty diapers challenge that family to *love that baby, and to help the baby by changing its diaper. God does not have dirty diapers—at least, not since Jesus grew up from being a baby* \square —but God have desert prayer which challenges us to grow truer and stronger in love, and on the other side of desert gives us deeper peace.

So, let's look at techniques for persevering you can use to work with God in desert prayer. Fair warning: these techniques do not pump your brain with endorphins to make yourself *feel better*. *Rather, they are like the techniques marathon runners use to push past mile 20 and keep going. They don't stop the hurting, but they do help you endure and finish and win through.*

The easier kind of desert prayer to handle is the kind that involves distractions. Pretty much everyone has some trouble with distractions in prayer, and the key technique is gently—gently!—turning your mind back to God. Think of your mind as a very cute puppy that you and God are taking for a walk. When the puppy goes running after a squirrel, there's no need to get all angry and upset or be mean to yourself. Rather, simply remember how much God loves walking with that little cute puppy in your head, and, gently give your mind a tug to bring it back to spending time with God. Even if a distraction really gets you and you have spent five minutes distracted before you even realize you were distracted, no problem—when you notice it, just gently turn your mind back to God. Distractions harm our prayer only when we deliberately chose to follow the distraction; when that happens, we stop praying. When distracted 8,000 times in prayer and 8,000 times you turn your mind back to God, then you just did 8,000 reps exercising your mind to love God: pretty cool you.

Ok. The harder kind of desert prayer is the kind that involves feeling empty or doubting or wanting to leave. For those times, I'll suggest three simply activities you can use to keep praying—remember, pray as you can, not as you can't. You can remember these three simple activities that rev up your desert using the acronym "Read, Express, Visualize", "R-E-V", "R.E.V." See what I did there? I Read: read the bible or some spiritual book. Express: use some phrase to express over and over your desire: "Jesus, I love you. Jesus, I love you. Jesus, I love you." Visualize: picture some scene from Jesus' life in your mind, like the Crucifixion or the Manger Scene, and just keep trying to hold that picture in your mind. Read, express, visualize: REV.

There's another week of Advent ahead, a week to prepare for Christmas. By committed prayer, let's learn to pray well. For even though the desert, there is a way, and the Lord speaks of peace to his people.



Saint Lucy Saint of the Day for December 13

Saint Lucy's Story

Every little girl named Lucy must bite her tongue in disappointment when she first tries to find out what there is to know about her patron saint. The older books will have a lengthy paragraph detailing a small number of traditions. Newer books will have a lengthy paragraph showing that there is little basis in history for these traditions. The single fact survives that a disappointed suitor accused Lucy of being a Christian, and she was executed in Syracuse, Sicily, in the year 304. But it is also true that her name is mentioned in the First Eucharistic Prayer, geographical places are named after her, a popular song has her name as its title, and down through the centuries many thousands of little girls have been proud of the name *Lucy*.

One can easily imagine what a young Christian woman had to contend with in pagan Sicily in the year 300. If you have trouble imagining, just glance at today's pleasure-at-all-costs world and the barriers it presents against leading a good Christian life.

Her friends must have wondered aloud about this hero of Lucy's, an obscure itinerant preacher in a far-off captive nation that had been destroyed more than 200 years before. Once a carpenter, he had been crucified by the Romans after his own people turned him over to their authority. Lucy believed with her whole soul that this man had risen from the dead. Heaven had put a stamp on all he said and did. To give witness to her faith she had made a vow of virginity. What a hubbub this caused among her pagan friends! The kindlier ones just thought her a little strange. To be pure before marriage was an ancient Roman ideal, rarely found, but not to be condemned. To exclude marriage altogether, however, was too much. She must have something sinister to hide, the tongues wagged.

Lucy knew of the heroism of earlier virgin martyrs. She remained faithful to their example and to the example of the carpenter, whom she knew to be the Son of God. She is the patroness of eyesight.

Reflection

If you are a little girl named Lucy, you need not bite your tongue in disappointment. Your patron is a genuine authentic heroine, first class, an abiding inspiration for you and for all Christians. The moral courage of the young Sicilian martyr shines forth as a guiding light, just as bright for today's youth as it was in A.D. 304.
