I thought you should know - April 21, 2021

Happy Easter! I am excited to be able to give you an update on our search for someone to take our new Worship Leader position. We have six candidates, including Greg Hulub who's been graciously helping us during the pandemic. I am working on recruiting a team to help me with the hiring process. I hope to start interviewing candidates in mid-May. Please keep praying for our discernment of who to hire!

I'd to explain a little more my thinking as I prepare to hire for our new Worship Leader position. I'm grateful that you took your time to share your thoughts with me. One reason I decided to create this position was that I felt a sense of urgency. In the years 2015-2019, the average Sunday congregation at Immaculate Heart of Mary parish declined 16%, from 534 to 370. My fear is that if the same pattern continues for another decade, the Archdiocese will judge that our parish lacks vitality, jeopardizing our future. And even more importantly, each year that Immaculate Heart of Mary's congregation shrinks is another year in which we will have missed the opportunity to bring the Gospel to people in our neighborhood who desperately need the wisdom and grace given by our Catholic faith. A decade may seem like a long time. Yet years go by swiftly, and learning how to go from being a shrinking congregation to a growing one will not be easy. I did not think we would be serving people in our parish well if I let a year go by before increasing our parish's investment in music for our Sunday Masses and Saturday Vigil Masses.

I believe that growth really is possible at Immaculate Heart of Mary parish. We have a core of wonderful parishioners. We also live in a great neighborhood. Did you know that the largest age demographic in our neighborhood is people who are 25 to 34 years old? We can do so much good for those young people, for the world, and for our faith if we can learn how to help more people become disciples and if we can learn how to help people grow as disciples. Moreover, I believe that weekend worship at Mass is our parish's biggest opportunity to make disciples and grow disciples. I also believe that excellent music is incredibly important—together with relevant preaching and a warm welcome—in helping people worship, pray and grow at Mass, especially for people who are just getting started in their faith.

Accordingly, after much discussion and prayer, I decided that our parish should significantly increase our investment in the worship music for our weekend Masses, in part by creating a new Worship Leader position with expanded duties. Since the person who leads our music is one of the most important positions affecting the success of our parish, I decided we should use a hiring process to find the best possible candidate rather than just offering the process to someone by default. I'm hopeful that the Lord Jesus and His Blessed Mother will lead us to a candidate who will make a huge difference in our worship and our evangelization in the years ahead. Since music is so important, I'm always glad to hear your ideas, concerns, and suggestions on how we can improve.

Finally, I wanted to make you aware of a new resource to help you pray when you are at weekend Masses here at Immaculate Heart. As you know, we have been using our bulletin to provide everyone with the readings and song lyrics. This started because we can't use the missalettes during the pandemic, but I've really liked how the change is helping people pray, because I think it is easier for guests and people just starting in the faith to use our bulletin rather than navigate a missalette. However, I know that some people really like having a missalette so they can read the readings throughout the week and prepare for mass. International Liturgy Publications makes a wonderful hardcover book called "Word of the Lord" that can serve you as a missalette for all the Sundays of every year! We have some copies at the rectory office; so feel free to stop by and take a look; if you would like to order one, our wonderful Pastoral Associate Debbie Gartner will tell you where to find it.

God bless you! The next installment of our "Share What You Have" homily series is below.

Courage is for facing fear, so it's remarkable when someone at same time has both courage and peace. Pope John XXIII had served in years that took required courage and had the peace to get a good night's sleep. For at the end of day, when he went to the chapel to pray, he'd talk with the Lord about what he as Pope had done poorly and what he had done well; he's pray about all the sufferings and problems he had heard about, and all the decisions he would fact tomorrow, then he would say, "Lord, it's your Church. I'm going to bed." The fact of Jesus' presence, that Jesus was in control, not the Pope, gave John XXIII courage and peace.

For us, too, there is a deep source from which we can draw courage and peace. Jesus rose from the dead. If you like me are a Christian, you heard about that fact from others. This week, we're in the second week of a new homily series

called "Share what you have". It's a homily series but about what unites us, because the foundation for sharing with is unity with others. Whether we realize it or not, the good news is that Jesus in his resurrection gave us spiritual treasure that deeply unites us with others. So, if we dive deep into that treasure, we come up with energy to share.

Today, I'd like us to dive deep into the basic fact of Jesus' resurrection. The basic fact of Jesus' resurrection is one of the biggest treasures given to us by Jesus. Let's think about the something basic, that the resurrection is a claim about facts. When a Christian says, "Jesus rose from the dead" that's not a claim about a mystical experience accessible only to a few. Nor is it a claim about a technique that makes your life better the more you practice it. Nor is it a claim about an idea or viewpoint that changes the way you see the world the more you study it. Later on, some steps down the road the fact that "Jesus Christ rose from the dead" connects to ideas and viewpoints and techniques and mystical experiences. But first of all, a Christian who says, "Jesus Christ is risen from the dead" is making a claim about facts, about the reports of eyewitnesses, eyewitnesses who knew that Jesus had died crucified in apparent contradiction to his claims to bring the Kingdom of God, and eyewitnesses who claimed that Jesus had been with them again in his body here on earth after he rose from the dead.

That certainly is a remarkable claim. Whatever you might believe about an afterlife, the normal expectation is that dead people don't come back to live again on this earth. Yet though the claim is a remarkable one, it's a claim about history and about facts, a claim about what happened, and so a claim you can investigate using historical methods, to see if the evidence makes that claim more or less probable than it first appears. If that sounds interesting to you, I highly recommend this book by Michael Licona about the historical evidence around Jesus' resurrection and the historical arguments pro and con, "The Resurrection of Jesus: a New Historiographical Approach". I loved this book, though it's thick, because it is readable and I found the author to be even-handed, careful, and insightful. He's not interested in persuasion by emotion; he's interested in history and facts.

Our Scripture readings today show that also the first Christians were interested in facts. Luke reports that the resurrected Jesus let his startled and terrified friends touch him and talk with him and feed him food. Why did Jesus do this? Why did the first Christian's pass on these memories? Why did Luke write those details down? It was because they knew about visions and dreams and parables and about crazy people. It mattered to the first Christians that the details of their experiences did not fit with the explanation of a vision or dream or parable or hallucination, but fit with the explanation that they had met in person on earth in his body their friend Jesus after he rose from the dead.

That's why Jesus says to them, "you are witnesses of all these things" and Peter fifty days after Easter tells the crowd that apostles are witnesses. In court, if you are a witness and a lawyers asks you to give an opinion, the lawyer on the other side, the opposing counsel will say, "Objection! Calls for a conclusion". If the lawyer questioning you asks you to make a guess, the lawyer on the other side will say, Objection! Calls for speculation". The job of a witness is not to guess or explain, but to tell what they personally know and how they learned it. Jesus called his disciples witnesses because the foundation stone of faith and the core of the Christian religion is a claim about facts, the claim that God had raised Jesus Christ from the dead.

That unites us to others, even to people who don't believe. For a claim about facts is something that reasonable people can discuss, not a claim about a mystical experience that only people who have it can describe, or a claim about a technique that only its practitioners can discuss. What is more, the fact that the core of faith is about facts means that wherever you are at in your faith life, whether you are super advanced or just getting started, or somewhere in between, you can share your faith with others. You can report a fact to others even before you can explain it, before you understand it. That means, you can help someone who needs courage, you can give someone peace, even before you have faith all figured out. You can say to someone who is grateful and happy, "God is so good". You can say to someone who to someone who is discouraged, "I have hope for you". You can say to someone wondering if it makes sense to trust God or strive for what's right, "Jesus rose from the dead" If it is true for anyone, it is true for everyone, so you can simply report the fact, and then be patient and friendly and listen while the other person thinks about what you said and whether they want to try to build on that foundation.

So this week, I invite you to share what you have. Share your faith. For we all need a foundation that makes courage and peace make sense. And in Jesus' resurrection, we all have it.

Communion of Saints

In last week's column, I mentioned the importance of sharing our experience of God in our lives. As disciples, we can never under estimate the power of our faith and God working in our lives. Over the past twenty plus years, I have heard one sentence continuously; "I do not know what I would do without my faith."

Isn't that the truth?! Through the happy times, frightening and worrisome times, having faith and people of faith to rely on, offers hope, peace and carries us through. As Christian, we are united by our faith. As disciples we are called to share our faith, especially with those who are struggling or who do not know Jesus. Sharing your knowledge or love of Scripture can begin to stir the Spirit.

Sharing your personal experiences, that which speaks of your own personal relationship with Jesus and belief in the resurrection can open their minds and offer curiosity and hope.

Years ago, I shared a God moment that provided me with peace, awe and increased belief in the resurrection as well as the Communion of Saints.

Many years ago, on a Monday my test results came back that I had HIV and Hepatitis C. The doctor said she would run additional tests. I was devastated, I didn't know what I was going to do. I had myself dead and buried. All I could think was that I was going to die. My youngest daughter Alison was going to make her First Communion that weekend. I didn't think I would be here for her graduation; I wouldn't be here for my family...your mind can race out of control.

Wednesday, at 3:00 in the morning. I woke up and I couldn't sleep. I watched my husband sleep, I went in my daughter's room and watched her sleep. I thought of my family and overwhelming grief brought me to tears. I sat on the sofa rocking and crying, calling out to God. I asked, please may I be spared. I began calling out the names of anyone and everyone I knew who had died; family, friends, parishioners, the Blessed Mother. I asked for them to intercede for me. In a split second my living room was filled with arches of light. The arches left almost as quickly as they arrived. I knew the arches of light were my loved ones, the people who I had just prayed to. There were no faces, no body shapes, just the light and the knowing I was surrounded by love.

That Sunday at Alison's First Communion Mass, for the first time, I had a new understanding and increased belief in the Communion of Saints! Our loved ones have seen the face of God, they are in heaven and with us. Jesus's promise of the resurrection is alive and real.

I share this story that we may all find hope and comfort in knowing God is real! Heaven is real! Our rising on the last day is real! Our loved ones are with us! May we all be united and find strength in our faith.

Through sharing our faith and experiences, may we all continue the work of the first disciples and those who followed them. May we the parishioners of Immaculate Heart of Mary continue to grow as disciples and grow God's Kingdom, by growing new disciples! Amen!

Saint Pedro de San José Betancur Saint of the Day for April 26

Saint Pedro de San José Betancur's Story

Central America claimed its first saint with the canonization of Pedro de San José Betancur. Known as the "Saint Francis of the Americas," Pedro de Betancur is the first saint to have worked and died in Guatemala.

Pedro very much wanted to become a priest, but God had other plans for the young man born into a poor family on Tenerife in the Canary Islands. Pedro was a shepherd until age 24, when he began to make his way to Guatemala, hoping to connect with a relative engaged in government service there. By the time he reached

Thavana, he was out of money. After working there to earn more, he got to Guatemala City the following year. When he arrived, he was so destitute that he joined the breadline that the Franciscans had established.

Soon, Pedro enrolled in the local Jesuit college in hopes of studying for the priesthood. No matter how hard he tried, however, he could not master the material; he withdrew from school. In 1655, he joined the Secular Franciscan Order. Three years later, he opened a hospital for the convalescent poor; a shelter for the homeless, and a school for the poor soon followed. Not wanting to neglect the rich of Guatemala City, Pedro began walking through their part of town ringing a bell and inviting them to repent.

Other men came to share in Pedro's work. Out of this group came the Bethlehemite Congregation, which won papal approval after Pedro's death. A Bethlehemite sisters' community, similarly founded after Pedro's death, was inspired by his life of prayer and compassion.

He is sometimes credited with originating the Christmas Eve *posadas* procession in which people representing Mary and Joseph seek a night's lodging from their neighbors. The custom soon spread to Mexico and other Central American countries.

Pedro died in 1667, and was canonized by Pope John Paul II in Guatemala City on July 30, 2002.

Calling the new saint an "outstanding example" of Christian mercy, the Holy Father noted that Saint Pedro practiced mercy "heroically with the lowliest and the most deprived." Speaking to the estimated 500,000 Guatemalans in attendance, the Holy Father spoke of the social ills that plague the country today and of the need for change.

"Let us think of the children and young people who are homeless or deprived of an education; of abandoned women with their many needs; of the hordes of social outcasts who live in the cities; of the victims of organized crime, of prostitution or of drugs; of the sick who are neglected and the elderly who live in loneliness," he said in his homily during the three-hour liturgy.

The liturgical feast of Saint Pedro de San José Betancur is celebrated on April 25.

Reflection

As humans, we often pride ourselves on our ability to reason. But as Pedro's life shows, other skills may be an even more crucial element of our humanity than a clever mind: compassion, imagination, love. Unable to master studies for the priesthood despite his efforts, Pedro responded to the needs of homeless and sick people; he provided education to the poor and salvation to the rich. He became holy—as fully human as any of us can ever be.
